No other big city offers such a generous subsidy to developers and wealthy homebuyers, and the data are clear that the City of Philadelphia should not continue to do so.

The City has limited authority over state and corporate tax structure, but I absolutely support reform at those levels, in addition to supporting whatever municipal tax reforms may be enacted within the bound of the law. Comments:

I first proposed Community Schools for Philadelphia in 2014 and have visited the city of Cincinnati to learn from their model. I believe this the most efficient way to leverage limited resources, and I would like for the District and Administration to be more aggressive about expansion.

What is your vision for public education in Philadelphia, and how have you worked (either currently in office or your current position) to promote an equity agenda in Philadelphia's schools?

When I was growing up in North Philadelphia, schools were central to the entire community -not just students and parents. I believe that our city and neighborhoods should be centered around schools again. Our public education systems have been weakened by charters and privatizers, and there is now a caste system in American public education. Either you stand for equality and equity or you don't, in my opinion. Your neighborhood school tells the story of your neighborhood, and in too many of our neighborhoods that story isn't good. All city policies should be informed by the desire to fix that.
